Second grade will begin with Jan Harding Nutrition Educator UF/IFAS Family Nutrition Program teaching the "Youth Understanding MyPlate", (YUM) series of nutrition lessons beginning Wednesday, October II, at 10:30 am for a weekly lesson on gardening and nutrition. The students will also plant a cool season vegetable garden with her in their own outdoor raised garden beds outside the classroom. In math, students will continue to analyze one-step and two-step word problems, including missing parts. They will also determine and explain whether equations are true or false. In science, students will be learning about changes to matter. They will be conducting various activities that demonstrate physical and chemical changes. Thanks to the Pets in Classroom grant, our freshwater fish tank is now up and running. Students will begin their aquarist classroom jobs and learn how to maintain a freshwater ecosystem.



ELA is diving into non fiction benchmarks. We are focusing on the different text structures (cause and effect, chronological order and text features). We just finished the "Lemonade War" book club book and started "The Terrible Two." Make sure you check your child's AR goals and ensure that they are reading at home nightly.

In Math, 3rd-grade students will investigate and study geometric figures. They will draw line(s) of symmetry in a two-dimensional figure and identify line symmetric two-dimensional figures, describe and draw points, lines, line segments, rays, intersecting lines, perpendicular lines and parallel lines, identify these in two-dimensional figures, and identify and draw quadrilaterals based on their defining attributes. Quadrilaterals include parallelograms, rhombi, rectangles, squares and trapezoids.

In Science, students will explore the properties of matter. They will determine different types of rocks and minerals based on observations and measurements of properties.

Students will be working on poetry and informational texts in reading. Those standards cover author's purpose and summarizing texts. We are all continuing with our paragraph and essay writing with a focus on expository writing. Students are working on their Create a Country project in social studies.

In math we are working on our new multiplication and division unit. We are reviewing different strategies to perform these operations reliably and interpreting the information in real world contexts.

In Science we are finishing up Big Idea 8 (properties of matter) and diving into Big idea 9 (Changes in matter). We'll go over the differences between chemical and physical changes. Also, we'll look at how the removal or application of heat can cause matter to change states.

5th Grade ELA will continue to read Out of My Mind in class, as we finish up our novel studies on this wonderful book. We will be focusing on informational and argumentative texts in reading this month. In writing, we will begin our argumentative essay unit and students will be learning about the writing process and how to write an argumentative essay. Additionally, students will focus on using million dollar words in their writing to take their essays to the next level. Students should continue to read at home for 2 hours each week in order to reach their AR goals by the end of the quarter. Scholars should also complete their daily Typing Club minutes in order to prepare for typing their essays this year.

In math and science, our 5th grade scholars will be working on many exciting projects to prepare for our Math Night on Thursday, October 12th. They will be in charge of the decorations and running stations for all elementary students. Math this month will focus on fluency, problem solving strategies, place value, and decimal operations. In science, our fifth graders will be investigating Matter and Its Properties as well as Changes in Matter; studying Earth in Space and Time, and receiving an introduction to Force and Motion.









In 6th grade ELA, students will be reading two short stories featuring two fabulously "wicked" women. Then, they will complete an essay arguing which of the two characters was the bigger "villain". They will also be creating symbolic pumpkins that highlight characters from the story.

8th Grade

This month 8th graders will develop their argumentative writing skills to include ethos, pathos, logos, and kairos. Students will also get to "Choose Your Adventure when deciding which argumentative essay they would like to write. Also, put May llth on your calendars for Gradventure! Yep, it's a Saturday this year. More info will be coming in the 3rd quarter.



We begin unpacking civilizations, with their respective geography, religions, achievements, politics, economics and social structure, or G.R.A.P.E.S.. 1st stop Mesopotamia and the Fertile Crescent.



7th Grade

Action and reactions. from the British crown and the Parliament towards the 13 colonies building up to the Declaration of Independence & the Revolutionary War have been the topics of unit 1.3. Now we turn to the early years of the nation under the Articles of Confederation and the constitutional controversies.




8th Grade

Our historians will focus on the American Revolution its causes, course, and consequences.





In October, we'll take our assessment on cells. Then move into cell processes. The goal is to explore how cells of all organisms undergo similar processes to maintain homeostasis, including extracting energy from food, getting rid of waste, and reproducing. We will conclude these lessons with a project where students will create a 3D model of photosynthesis.



For the month of October, we will be spending the first couple of weeks going over operations with integers (introducing adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing negative numbers). After we finish that up, we will move on to graphing on the coordinate plane (plotting on all four quadrants). Then it's on to ratios and rates (this will spill into November).

As we approach the second marking period; we are hoping to bring in more energy and effort as I am trying to get them prepared for Algebra next year! Please have your scholars work in Khan Academy or IXL to practice problems from class at least 10-15 minutes per day. Also, I will be tutoring on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday every week after school. 
Algebra I


We have put in some major work during these first seven weeks of class! We have just finished the Key Features of Linear Functions unit. Our pace has slowed down a bit; but don't worry, we will eventually pick it up. We have been doing problems daily and working in IXL to get more practice. Please have your scholars do practice problems in IXL about 10-15 minutes daily. This will help them perform better on test. The students that put forth the effort to do practice math at home usually grasp the concept much quicker. Also, I will be tutoring on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday every week after school. All lessons and Google Slides are located in Launchpad in Math Nation. Next up: Scatter Plots and Linear Relationships!

Geometry

Students in Geometry are working on their fourth unit on Rigid Motions and Congruence. We will be going deeper with topics such as translations, reflections, rotations, and dilations.

Dr. Carr offers tutoring on every morning from 8:00 to 8:45.

Advanced Academics with Mrs. Dunn

In Mrs. Dunn's Advanced Academics class, the students are continuing to work on their first team PBL project of the year on Communication and the Brain. Mrs. Dunn will continue to model the process. From the end of September and into October, Mrs. Dunn's students will create an Inquiry Question (this is the driving question that guides the students through the research process), a SMART Goal, and an Action Plan based on their team's topic. The students will research, take notes from reliable sources, and create a product for an authentic audience. As of now, these projects will be due on Tuesday, October 24th. After all of the presentations, the students will begin creating their own individual projects based on their interests and passions. We will also continue reading and discussing the book, 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens. By the end of the month, we will have read through Habit #6.



In French, students will be learning and celebrating Hispanic Heritage Month by reading texts about famous Hispanics (in French, of course). They will also be completing a research project on one of these people.

Students in Speech & Debate are continuing their study on Congressional Debate, developing and debating bills, rebuttals, and fallacies. They will learn about Public Forums next.





Art I students will be learning about the history of weaving. They will be working on a variety of weaving lessons during the month of October.

Art 2 students will be starting a unit on fiber arts. Students will learn basic hand sewing concepts and incorporate a variety of techniques to create one of kind works of art.

Elementary Art -

Students have been busy learning and creating in the Art room! During the month of October, second graders will be learning about artist Mercedes Lagunas. After viewing her Boho Garden series, students will create their own flower garden paintings. Second graders will be learning about primary colors, secondary colors, tints, and experiment with color mixing throughout the lesson. Third graders will also learn about artist Mercedes Lagunas with a focus on her pop art inspired work. They will be taking inspiration from her pop art compositions and creating their own masterpieces. Fourth graders will be learning about the life and art of Rufino Tamayo.
