Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the eighth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Orlando Gifted K8 serves 427 students enrolled in grades second through eighth. The student population's ethnicity is made of 16% Hispanic and 84% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 62% White, 13% Black, 0% Native, 18% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 7% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Sean Maguire and Assistant Principal Andrea Hale. Orlando Gifted K8 is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Sunshine State Young Readers Award, Chess Clubs, Safety Patrols, Lego League, Odyssey of the Mind, Garden Club, National Junior Honor Society, National Elementary Honor Society, CTE, Battle of the Books, Drama Club, Chorus, Student Government.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Orlando Gifted K8 indicates that the average age of the collection is 2013 and the number of books per student is 16. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for highly effective media centers that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection.

At this time, Orlando Gifted K8 does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- The fact that our ELA proficiency is 90% or higher shows that we need higher level books.
- There are 3,000+ eBooks, audiobooks & digital magazines available in Sora and Destiny.
- This collection is in need of more popular fiction, graphic novels and non-fiction books like technology, computers, and animals that interest students that are more recently published.
- We are in need of more recently published computer and technology books as the age is older than recommended at an average of 2017 and the section also needs to be weeded.

- We have improved our number of Asian representation books by 3.2% of the total collection, our Hispanic representation books by 2.5% of the total collection and our Black representation books by 1% of our total collection, reflecting our student body.
- Weeding will focus on the OCPS Catalog Project as well as aged titles in fiction and/or nonfiction.

Comparison between 2021-22 and 2022-23 Testing Data

(adapted from https://www.fldoe.org/accountability/assessments/k-12-student-assessment/results/2023.stml) In 2023, the state transitioned from Florida Standards Assessments (FSA) to Florida Assessment of Student Thinking (FAST) for English Language Arts (ELA) and Mathematics. The 2022-23 for FAST and Benchmarks for Excellent Student Thinking (B.E.S.T.) End-of-Course (EOC) assessments are based on **provisional** achievement level cuts that are linked to each assessment's respective 2021-22 reporting scale. Comparisons should not be made between the 2023 data and previous years' data. The implementation of FAST K-2 in the 2022-23 school year was the first administration of statewide assessments for students in grades K-2. These assessments include Star Early Literacy Proficiency, Star Reading Proficiency, and Star Math Proficiency.

Collection Analysis

The collection is developed for and influenced by students, their interests, academic needs and alignment to the curriculum. The data below is a snapshot of the collection based on a Titlewise Analysis from July 2023. Purchasing or weeding after that time is not reflected in this data.
